

Andreas Antoniadis, Assistant Professor, European Economy, [Currently on unpaid leave]

Andreas Antoniadis has taught at the universities of Essex, LSE and Sussex and has been the director of the Centre for Global Political Economy at Sussex, and the Athens Centre for International Political Economy. His current research focuses on the nature and implications of the global economic crisis, the changing dynamics between emerging and advanced economies, and the changing power politics and economics of global debt.

Constantine Arvanitopoulos, Professor, International Relations Theory, Foreign Policy Analysis, Comparative Politics

Constantine Arvanitopoulos is Professor of International Relations at the Department of International and European Studies at Panteion University, Athens. He is a graduate of Panteion University and holds an MA and a PhD in International Relations from the School of International Service, American University, Washington DC.

He has been Lecturer on International Relations and Comparative Politics at the School of International Service at the American University (1987-89), Post-doctoral Fellow at the Center for European Studies at Harvard University (1990-92) and Assistant Professor of Government and European Politics at the Department of Public and International Affairs at George Mason University (1992-95).

His research interests are in International Relations theory, specifically the study of regime change, European politics and US foreign policy analysis. He has taught courses on theory and methodology of International Relations, European politics, and comparative politics.

He has published articles on the EU, the non-aligned movement, Greek-Turkish relations, the study of leadership and authoritarian regimes. He has written books on the transitions from authoritarianism to democracy, on transatlantic relations, on US foreign policy and a textbook on international relations.

He was the Director General of the Constantinos Karamanlis Institute for Democracy from 2000 to 2010. His latest appointments include the following: Representative of the New Democracy Party (ND) to the National Council of Foreign Policy, Member of the Academic Council of the Centre for European Studies (CES) and Member of the Board of Directors of UNESCO-Greece. Constantine Arvanitopoulos was also the spokesperson for the New Democracy Party during the national elections of September 2007.

He was Director of the Political Office of the President of New Democracy from 2009-2011. On November 11, 2011 he was appointed Alternate Minister of Education, Lifelong Learning and Religion in the coalition Government of Lucas Papademos. In the national elections of May 6th, 2012 he was elected member of the Greek Parliament with New Democracy and in the elections of June 17th he was reelected and was appointed Minister of Education, Religious Affairs, Culture and Sport. He served as Minister of Education until June 13, 2014.

Short Bio

Andreas Gofas is Assistant Professor of IR Theory at Panteion University of Athens and Honorary Research Fellow with the Department of Politics at the University of Sheffield. In the past, he has held visiting research positions at Yale University (Visiting Scholar), the University of St Andrews (Royal Society of Edinburgh Visiting Fellow), the University of Sheffield (Marie Curie Fellow), the Institut Barcelona d'Estudis Internacionals (Postdoctoral Fellow), and the LSE (Visiting Fellow). His research interests include: IR theory; Social Theory and the Philosophy of Social Sciences; the History and Sociology of IR knowledge; Terrorism and Political Violence; Risk Analysis.

Courses (Taught or Co-Taught)

Undergraduate Level

International Relations I

This is an introductory course to IR theory. As such, it examines the historical evolution of the field, its main methodological controversies, and its foundational concepts and theories.

International Relations II

The main objective of this course is to illustrate the applicability and policy relevance of IR theory by providing a theoretically informed analysis of major historical and contemporary

topics of international politics.

History & Philosophy of International Relations

The aim of this course is twofold: a) to provide an overview of the state-of-the-art in advanced IR theory and meta-theory; and b) to maintain a focus on the flow of theoretical ideas in the history of IR and connect this evolution with issues in the philosophy of social sciences.

Special Topics in International Politics.

This course focuses on the study of conflict and political violence. It covers issues such as terrorism, ethnic conflicts and civil wars.

Graduate Level

➤ *Theory & Methodology of International Relations*

This course focuses on the main theoretical and methodological controversies in contemporary IR theory.

➤ *Topics in International Politics*

This course covers main contemporary topics in international politics, such as: globalization, terrorism, religion and politics, gender and politics etc.

Dimitris Keridis Professor of International Relations and Foreign Policy

A. Biography:

Dimitris Keridis is a Professor of International Politics at Panteion University of Athens. He is a senior fellow at the Konstantinos G. Karamanlis Foundation and the deputy director of the Institute of International Relations in Athens. Since 2002 he has been directing the annual Olympia Summer Academy in Politics and International Studies in Greece (www.olympiasummeracademy.org) and since 2009 the Navarino Network, a public policy think-tank based in Thessaloniki (www.navarinonetwork.org). He is also a regular TV political commentator. He has served as a senior consultant at the Greek Ministry of Foreign Affairs, as the Constantine Karamanlis Associate Professor in Hellenic and European Studies at the Fletcher School, Tufts University, as the director of the Kokkalis Foundation in Athens and of the Kokkalis Program at the John F. Kennedy School of Government, Harvard University, and as a senior researcher at the Institute for Foreign Policy Analysis, USA. His latest book in English is entitled: *The Historical Dictionary of Modern Greece*, London: The Scarecrow Press, Inc., to be reprinted and updated in 2016. His recent books in Greek include a monograph on "Nationalism, Ethnic Conflicts and International Relations: Theory and Practice in the Balkans" and "Constantine G. Karamanlis and the Foreign Press" as well as the editing of the

collective volume entitled “Thessaloniki: A city in transition, 1912-2012”.

B. Courses:

Undergraduate Program:

1. International Relations I (309)

The course offers an introduction to the theory of international relations, its basic paradigms and its historical development. The course also attempts to apply the theory on some contemporary international policy questions.

2. Greek Diplomatic History (454)

Taught with the participation of Antonis Klapsis

3. European Integration and Balkan Security (426)

Co-taught with Marilena Koppa

The course examines the Balkan security landscape and the position of the region within the broader European security architecture. The point of departure is a discussion of the anti-Balkan stereotype and the dissolution of the Ottoman empire. The aim is to familiarize the students with the problems involved in nation and state-building and the violence produced by this process, with the help of two main case-studies: Yugoslavia and Cyprus. The second half of the course examines the European prospects of Balkan countries and Europe’s policy of enlargement so far. A special emphasis will be given on the interaction of national with European politics.

Graduate Program: International Relations and Strategic Studies

The course examines the international relations of modern Greece since 1830, with an emphasis on the challenges Greek foreign and security policy is faced with today. The course focuses on the diplomatic history of Greece, the consequences of European integration and the geopolitical changes following the end of the Cold War.

Director of the Master's Degree "European Intergration and Law" of the General Department of Law (2012-2014), member of the Scientific Board of several research centers, vice director of the Section "European Law and Institutions" of the Department of International, European and Area Studies and Attorney at Law (1987-2012).

CONSTANTINOS KOLIOPOULOS – BIOGRAPHICAL NOTE

Constantinos Koliopoulos is Assistant Professor of International Politics and Strategic Studies at Panteion University and Professor of Strategic Studies at the Hellenic National Defence College. He has authored, co-authored or co-edited a number books on Strategic Studies and International Politics, the last one being a co-authored volume on Sun Tzu's Art of War, including a fully annotated translation of the text.

C. KOLIOPOULOS – COURSE OUTLINES

344 INTRODUCTION TO SOCIAL SCIENCE METHODS

TUTOR: C. KOLIOPOULOS

1. The course covers the fundamental concepts of scientific methodology and the basic technical matters regarding the conduct of scientific research projects. Among others, it examines the concepts of science, paradigm, theory, technique, while also dealing with a number of ethical issues pertaining to science and academic life in general. In addition, the students acquire the technical background (methodological research diagram, citation-reference techniques, etc.) for the proper conduct and presentation of scientific research.

211 STRATEGIC STUDIES

TUTOR: C. KOLIOPOULOS

1. This course examines the conflictual dimension (actual or potential) of international relations. The course begins with the analysis of basic strategic concepts such as the meaning and the logic of strategy, the phenomenon of war, offense-defense, deterrence-compellence, etc. After that, it examines the contribution of classical strategists Clausewitz and Sun Tzu, and finally it covers the specific areas of naval, air, and nuclear strategy, as well as guerrilla warfare. The course rests on massive use of both historical and contemporary illustrative examples, with special emphasis on the Second World War.

286 EUROPEAN SECURITY, DEFENSE, AND POLITICAL UNIFICATION

TUTOR: C. KOLIOPOULOS

1. Historical review of European security during 1945-1991. The basic parameters of European security. NATO and European security after the Cold War. The Common Defense and Security Policy (CSDP) of the EU. Strategic consequences of a possible Turkish accession to the EU. Russia and European security. The Mediterranean and European security.

308 HISTORY OF INTERNATIONAL RELATIONS AND STRATEGY I

TUTORS: H. PAPASOTIRIOU – C. KOLIOPOULOS

1. Analysis of the evolution of the international system and strategy during the Antiquity and the Middle Ages, with emphasis on the interaction thereof. Analysis of the ancient Greek, Roman, and Byzantine thought on International Relations and Strategy.

Fields of competence: International Law including Use of Force and International Courts and Tribunals, Humanitarian Law and Action, International and European Human Rights Law, including Migrants and Refugees, European Law and Institutions.

Assistant Professor at International European and Area Studies Department, Panteion University; Head of the Humanitarian Action Unit of the European Training Center for Human Rights and Humanitarian Action (EKEKDAAD) teaching international law, use of force, international courts and tribunals with an emphasis on ad hoc Criminal Law Tribunals for the former Yugoslavia and Rwanda and the International Criminal Court, the humanitarian law /action, European Institutions and Human Rights, European policies on mixed migration, as well as disaster preparedness in trainings of staff and volunteers and NGOs, is also an invited professor at the EIUC/ EMA Master on Human Rights and Democratization (Joint Program of 48 Universities) (Venice, Italy), of REACT Course of Helsinki ESPANA, of the Political Sciences and Public Administration Faculty (teaching EU humanitarian action) in Nikosia, Cyprus, as well as of the University of the Aegean, teaching human rights and European humanitarian governance. Consultant on humanitarian action and principles at the Hellenic Red Cross (1999-), Member of the Comité pour le Concours Jean Pictet, Trainer of Red Cross Staff and Volunteers (Greece), and Msf, MdM at Police National Security School, National Defense School, NATO Peace Operations Unit.

Holds a PHD (2004) in International Law (State and Individual Criminal Responsibility for war crimes, crimes against humanity and genocide, and a Post Doc on "Humanitarian Assistance in International Law. Has participated in research for the European Migration Network) and IHL civil protection /defense implementation in Greece. In total 9 years of teaching experience, and in the last three years on EU humanitarian action and civil protection in Erasmus Intensive Summer Course (Responsible for selecting the subject, submission of application, organization and co-teaching).

More than 15 years of experience in humanitarian fieldwork, through OSCE, UNHCR and then International Committee of the Red Cross, in armed conflicts (1996 Bosnia Herzegovina, 1997 Albania, 1999 Kosovo, 1998-99 Sri Lanka, and then onwards based in Greece with short missions in disaster response missions through the Hellenic Red Cross).

Courses description in English by Assistant Prof. Maria Daniella Marouda

➤ International Law I (5 ECTS)

This course focuses on the content and structure of international law by examining its foundation, its status and its application. Main chapters examined are: Subjects of International Law, Sources of International Law with special emphasis on the Law of Treaties, Custom and General Principles of International law, the relationship between international legal order and internal legal order (with references to the Greek constitutional order and practice), as well as issues of state responsibility.

➤ International Humanitarian Law /Humanitarian Action

The course includes the study of international humanitarian law (IHL) applicable in armed conflict and/or occupation, through exploring the theory and practice in modern conflicts

(Gaza, Iraq, Afghanistan, Lebanon, Sudan), the lessons of the war on terrorism and challenges of the direct participation of civilians in hostilities and humanitarian action. This course specifically focuses on the protection of individuals and groups during international and non-international armed conflicts, recognizing the specificity of IHL in relation to international human rights law and international criminal law. It is basically an overview of the applications of IHL in the light of contemporary challenges. Simulation seminars on visiting a detention camp, humanitarian mapping, and IHL application in contemporary conflicts form part of the educational package.

The class is highly participatory and will encourage diversity of opinion and respect for differing views. To promote active learning, we use a series of in-class simulations and other exercises.

- **International Justice (or International Courts and Tribunals (Ass. Prof. M.D. Marouda -Ass. Prof. O. Tsolka) (+ a Seminar for Jessup International Moot Courting, Ass. Prof. M.D.Marouda)**

The course focuses on the fundamentals of international jurisdiction, the notion of international dispute, and practice and procedure before international courts and tribunals by primarily focusing on the International Court of Justice ("ICJ"). Moreover other Courts and Tribunals will be compared to the ICJ and analyzed, such as the International Tribunal on the Law of the Sea, the International Criminal Courts, as well as the ad hoc Tribunals, and Regional Courts on Human Rights, such as the ECHR, IACHR, ACHR and the Courts of the EU.

- **International and European Protection of Human Rights (with Prof. X. Tagaras)**

This course has been specifically designed to address the needs and interests of students of international studies and, in particular, those engaged in the study of peace and conflict resolution, international law, international politics and international development. The course introduces the main United Nations (the Universal Declaration of Human Rights of 1948, the UN Covenants of 1966, Human Rights Council etc.) and regional systems (Council of Europe, the European Convention on Human Rights system with emphasis on ECHR case-law, European Union etc.), America (American Convention on Human Rights) and Africa (African Charter on Human and Peoples' Rights).

The focus turns then to Europe and the course addresses the European Convention on Human Rights and certain thematic areas of interest such as protection of minorities, refugees and asylum, immigration, women and children, racism, as well as relations with International Humanitarian Law, Human Rights and International Politics. Students become acquainted with the methodology of human rights fact-finding, with attention given to learning and practicing interview techniques and planning investigations.

The class is highly participatory and encourages diversity of opinion and respect for differing views. To promote active learning, we use a series of in-class simulations and other exercises.

Master courses : International and European Studies Master –Specialization on International Law and Diplomatic Studies

- Use of Force and collective security in international law

The course focuses on the prohibition of jus of force in international law and international relations of states under the provisions of the UN Charter, in particular the relevant exceptions to the general prohibition: self-defense and Security Council authorization

under Ch VII under theory and practice. Issues of collective security and the relations between the UN and regional organizations are further analyzed. Issues on transnational terrorist networks (ISIS/ISIL, Daech, Boko haram et. Al.) Case studies include : Nicaragua /US, Congo /Uganda, Cyprus, Libya, Sudan, Syria, Israel /Palestinian Occupied Territories, Lebanon, Russia /Ukraine, Russia /Georgia, Afghanistan, Iraq.

- International Justice: International Courts and Tribunals

The course focuses on the fundamentals of international jurisdiction, the notion of international dispute, and practice and procedure before international courts and tribunals by primarily focusing on the International Court of Justice ("ICJ"). Students examine the ICJ's history, organization, competence and role as a permanent international institution and mechanism for the pacific settlement of disputes between States. Students also learn how a case is brought before the ICJ and how various procedural and preliminary matters such as jurisdiction, standing and admissibility are addressed before the Court. Particular attention will be paid to the jurisprudence of the ICJ and the International Centre for Settlement of Investment Disputes. Moreover other Courts and Tribunals will be compared to the ICJ and analyzed, such as the International Tribunal on the Law of the Sea, the International Criminal Courts, as well as the ad hoc Tribunals, and Regional Courts on Human Rights, such as the ECHR, IACHR, ACHR.

- Law and Politics of human rights and minorities.

The course focuses on the international and regional protection of human rights, on asylum and migration and minority protection, especially through the mechanisms of the Council of Europe and the European Union.

- International Criminal Law with (Ass. Prof. O. Tsolka)

This course explores the development and enforcement of international criminal law. It will focus on the theory of individual responsibility in international law, the substantive principles of international criminal law and the international criminal tribunals, through the most recent case law of the ad hoc ICTY and ICTR and the ICC.

Inter-Departmental Master Program on *Gender, Society, Politics*

Course: Gender and International Conflicts

The course focuses on gender in international law, the security council resolution 1325 on women, peace, security, international humanitarian law and gender, sexual violence and the international criminal tribunals case law.

Maria Meng-Papantoni, Associate Professor of European Business Law

Maria Meng-Papantoni is Associate Professor of European Business Law at the Panteion University of Athens. She studied law at the Law Faculty of the University of Athens and the University of Pantheon-Assas (Paris II), where she was awarded her PhD in 1995.

Professor Meng-Papantoni is teaching European (institutional and material) law, international business law, international investment law as well as Corporate Governance. She is the author of several books and articles on European and Hellenic economic and corporate law. Her work includes the following monographs:

- L'immixtion dans le droit des sociétés (PhD thesis, 1998)
- Investment advices and portfolio management (in Greek, 2000)
- The law of energy. European aspect and Greek implementation (in Greek, 2003)
- The services of general economic interest. In the network markets of electronic services, post, energy and public transportation (in Greek, 2013)
- The internal market according to article 26.2 TFEU - Freedom of goods, persons, services, capital (cowriter with Prof. H. Tagaras), Nomiki Bibliothiki, 2013, (in Greek)

Professor Meng-Papantoni was Visiting Scholar at the Institute of International Economic law at Georgetown Law University (2010) and taught at the Law Faculty of the University of Kunming (province of Yunnan-China). She was also a Visiting Professor at the Summer School 2015 of the Renmin University-Beijing.

Apart from her academic career Professor Meng-Papantoni is a member of the Athens Bar Association and is legal advisor on issues of structure and corporate governance at the National Bank of Greece. She is a member of numerous professional organizations.

1. Prof. Meng-Papantoni lectures the following subject-matters for graduate students:

A. European Law :

For the purpose of this lesson, Prof. Meng-Papantoni analyses the independence of the European law in relation to International law and national laws as well as the supremacy of European law. She analyses the powers and the interconnections of the European Institutions, such as the Commission, the Council and the European Parliament. The cycle of her courses also includes the problematic of the liability of the European Union.

B. European Law of the Internal Market :

She analyses the freedom of services, the freedom of establishment and the freedom of capital. The analysis of her lectures is based on the jurisprudence of the ECJ. The students are called to participate to this analysis by preparing and presenting cases of the ECJ.

C. Private International Law :

Prof. Meng-Papantoni analyses the Greek dispositions of private international law for the juridical ability of persons and the contracts. She also teaches the dispositions of Regulation of Rome I, comparing them with relevant Greek dispositions of private international law. Private international law of corporations and the relevant European jurisprudence of the ECJ is also analysed by her. The whole analysis of the course is based on relevant cases of Greek courts and the ECJ.

D. International Economic Law :

The course starts with the history of the WTO and the rounds that ended to the conclusion of the WTO. Then the analysis follows with the development of the institution of the WTO as an international Organization. Prof. Meng-Papantoni also analyses the law of GATT and the Dispute Settlement Understanding.

2. Prof. Meng-Papantoni is teaching the following subject matters for graduate students:

A. International Business Transactions

This course is about the legal issues of international sales. The lectures also include analysis on the legal issues of trans-border mobility of companies as well the phenomenon of off-shore companies.

B. European and International Corporate Governance

The course analyses the structure of companies in different legal systems, the economic and legal the advantages and disadvantages of relevant choices.

C. International Investment Law

This course is about the legal issues regarding the investment protection, the admission of establishment of an investment, the expropriation, the standards of protection of investment, the state responsibility, the political risk insurance of investment and the dispute settlement of investment.

Anargyros (Argyris) G. Passas

Associate Professor of State Administration and European Integration

- Organization of the European Union (Department of Social Policy)
(the course offers an introduction to the history, institutional organization and selected policies of the European Union, including the Treaty of Lisbon)
- European Union: Theories, Institutions and Policies (Department of Political Science and History)
(the course offers an introduction to the history, the political and institutional organization and selected policies of the European Union, including the Treaty of Lisbon)
- European Public Policy I: Policy Formulation (MA)
(the course offers an advanced analysis of the EU policy and decision-making processes, focusing on the legislative procedures)
- European Public Policy II: Policy Implementation (MA)
(the course offers an advanced analysis of the implementation stage of the EU policy process, including EU Delegated and Implementing acts/comitology)
- National Public Administration in the European Union (National School of Public Administration & Local Government)
(the course offers an advanced analysis of the EU policy and decision-making

INTERNATIONAL POLITICAL ECONOMY

Course Description:

The main premise of this course is that the global economy cannot be understood in isolation from the international political developments and therefore what is required is an appreciation of the political and economic dimensions of the current international monetary and trade systems, with special attention to the consequences of the evolutionary changes that took place after the collapse of the Berlin Wall. The course addresses the major topics and issues of the global political economy, examining the role and policies of the global players (U.S.A., E.U., China and Japan) towards them. Emphasis, also, is given to the sources of international cooperation, of the dynamism generated by the competitive relations among nations, firms, and other "independent" international institutions (e.g. NGOs), and the various ways interdependence affects political and economic choices.

Prerequisites:

Introductory courses in international politics and economics are required for this course, in order students to be comfortable with political and economic terminology.

Course Topics:

The course material is presented in 12 "lessons". The lesson topics are as follows:

1. Introduction to and overview of the International Political Economy
2. The alternative perspectives of the International Political Economy: Liberal, Realist and Radical Approaches.
3. The Institutional Framework of the Global Economy since World War II and after the collapse of the Berlin Wall.
4. The role of the state in the globalization era.
5. International Monetary Relations: Does the world need global rules to manage money?
6. The Economic theory of the International Civil Society: Trust, Commerce and open governance.
7. Economic Development, Inequality and War.
8. Foreign Direct Investments, Multinational Corporations and their role in Global Development.
9. Foreign Debt and Financial Crises.
10. Global Trade Relations: Between Laissez-faire and Regulation.
11. The Global Financial and Monetary systems: Challenges after the 2008 Crisis.
12. Contemporary Issues in the Global Political Economy.

Professor Grigoris Tsaltas, International Law

Grigoris I. Tsaltas, born in Athens, is Professor of International Law, teaches International Law of the Sea, International Environmental Law of and International Law of Development. Founding Director of the European Centre for Environmental Research and Training (EKEPEK). He holds a Doctorat D'Etat en Droit (unanimously excellent) in International Law from the University of Legal and Economic Sciences of Nice, a Masters' Degree from the Institut Européen des Hautes Etudes Internationales of the University of Nice, a Masters' Degree in Public International Law specializing in the Law of Development from Institut du Droit de la Paix et du Développement of the University of Nice and a Degree in Political Science from Panteion University of Social and Political Science.

His research interests contain: policies and international law of development, international law and international policy of environmental protection, international law of the sea, European policies of environmental protection, geography in international studies.

Courses Taught:

- **Geography in International Studies**

The course attempts a multifaceted approach of the international community

geography. The students are presented with elements of physical and human geography and their impact on contemporary international studies. The geographic aspect is being complemented with introductory remarks on regional and international cooperation as well as basic elements of international relations.

- **International Law of the Sea**

The scope of the course is to analyze the rights and responsibilities of nations in their use of the world's oceans. The main legal instrument examined is the United Nations Convention on the Law of the Sea (UNCLOS) of 1982, often described as the “constitution for the oceans”. The main topics to be discussed are: History and Codification of Law of the Sea, Common Heritage of Mankind, Jurisdictional Issues over the various maritime zones and the High Seas, exploitation of [ocean](#) resources and maritime security issues.

- **International Environmental Protection**

The course examines the historical evolution of the environmental movement, along with the major international environmental problems. It attempts an analysis of the sources and principles of international environmental law, as well as the identification of the role played by International Organizations. Finally, it refers to the outcomes of the UN Conferences for Sustainable Development starting from 1972 to 2012, with special reference to the Earth Summit of 1992, a keystone for international environmental governance and sustainable development.

- **International Law of Development**

The course focuses on the fields of Development Policy and Law. It examines issues relating to development theory since the boom of Liberation Movements in world politics, the evolution of International Law of Development, its sources and principles, the factors that contributed to the configuration of the identity of the South, as well as the evolution of the concept of sustainable development. As a law field, International Development Law is directly linked with the creation of conditions aiming at the democratization of international relations, as well as the evolution of traditional international law, to create equal development terms for all states of the international community.

- **European Environmental Protection Policy (Jean Monnet)**

The course focuses mainly on the examination of the problems of environmental

degradation that are common in European countries, with emphasis on those encountered in Greece. Moreover, it attempts an analysis of the specific economic and social impacts created by these problems, as well as the policy making processes of the EU, with special reference to the Environmental Action Programmes.

Olga Tsolka

Assistant Professor in Criminal Law and Criminal Procedure

Olga Tsolka studied at the School of Law, Democritus University of Thrace and at the University of Freiburg i/Br., Germany (Dr juris). She is authored several books, chapters and articles on matters related to Greek and European Criminal Law, financial crime and corruption, Criminal procedure and human rights. She is member of the Association of European Lawyers (member of the Board, 1997-2006), the Hellenic Criminal Bar Association (member of the Board), the Greek Association of Criminal Law and the International Association of Penal Law, as well member of Editorial Board of the Journal "Poinika Chronika".

Undergraduated Courses

1. Introduction in Law, 1st Semester: The course introduce non-jurists to Concepts and Principles of the domestic, international and european legal order.
2. International Cooperation in Criminal Matters, 5st Semester: These course focuses on the development of international cooperation in criminal matters, concerned particular with extradition, mutual legal assistance and transfer of convicted persons, as well the protection of human rights in this field. Further will be analyzed and compared with the EU judicial cooperation in criminal matters.
3. Human Security. Law and Policy, 7st Semester: These course focuses on key aspects on the notion of human security and her application at the international, regional and national levels. Specifically address the policies of the United Nations and the EU and relevant international texts related to combating trafficking in persons, transnational organized crime, terrorism and piracy.
4. International Justice, 7st Semester: The course focuses on the fundamentals of international jurisdiction, the notion of international dispute, and practice and procedure before international courts and tribunals by primarily focusing on the International Court of Justice ("ICJ"). Moreover other Courts and Tribunals will be compared to the ICJ and analyzed, such as the International Tribunal on the Law of the Sea, the International Criminal Courts, as well as the ad hoc Tribunals, and Regional Courts on Human Rights, such as the ECHR, IACHR, ACHR and the Courts of the EU.

Master's Degree Courses

1. Jus Commune Europaeum: European Public and Criminal Law, 1st Semester: The course focuses on critical issues related to EU Constitutionalisation, the development of the EU Criminal Law, including the case law of the CJEU and the EU bodies to combating transnational crime within the EU.

2. EU Area of Freedom Security and Justice, 1st Semester: The course focuses on the EU policies related to Immigration, judicial cooperation in civil as well in criminal matters. Particular emphasis is given to the EU rules and case law related to the principle of mutual recognition of judicial decisions and judgements, which is the cornerstone of judicial cooperation in both civil and criminal matters.
3. International Criminal Law, 2st Semester: This course explores the development and enforcement of international criminal law. It focuses on the theory of individual responsibility in international law, the substantive principles of international criminal law and the international criminal tribunals, through the most recent case law of the ad hoc ICTY and ICTR and the ICC.

Course: Political aspects of International Institutions
Spring semester compulsory course

Course description

The emerge of ethnic and irredentist claims, environmental issues, religion radicalism and international terrorism, in the 21st century, led theorists and policy makers in seeking solutions to ensure effective international cooperation and coordination of actions between state and non-state actors. Regional institutions such as NATO, the E.E, as much as global institutions, such as United Nations, International Bank, and the International Monetary Fund and NGO's, had to deal with a new form of conflict, which was the result of ethnic and tribal claims (Former Yugoslavia, Sudan, Rwanda, South Ossetia) and the collapse of the state structures (Somalia, Liberia). The first part of the course examines the dilemmas that the international community deals with, in terms of ways of managing new threats for the international peace and security. The main goal of the course is the students to get acquainted with the political importance of global, regional and transnational power structures. In the second part we examine how international and regional organizations operated in specific cases (Bosnia, Somalia, Afghanistan, Iraq) with

emphasis on evaluation of actions related to preventive diplomacy, peace building and humanitarian interventions.

Topics

1. Theory of international relations and international institutions
2. Cases of conflict in the new security environment and the role of international institutions
3. Case analysis and dilemmas of polymerization (Bosnia, Somalia, Afghanistan, Iraq, Syria).

Course: Theory of foreign policy Spring semester compulsory course

Course description The aim of the course is the understanding, analysis and interpretation of goals and instruments of foreign policy. The first part presents the theories and analytical study tools of state behavior in the light of the three levels of analysis, the individual, the state and the system. The course emphasizes on issues such as the role of the leader, of bureaucracy, of political and social parameters that determine and configure national policy, especially after the end of the Cold War, and the changes that have taken place in the nature of the international system. The second part analyzes the factors that designated the configuration of Greek external policy on bilateral level (Greek-Turkish relations, Greek-USA relations), and on a multilateral level (Greece relations with the UN, E.U, NATO) in the light of the above three levels of analysis.

Topics

1. Theoretical approaches on the analysis of foreign policy
2. Decision- taking factors and analysis levels
3. Leadership role (types and characteristics)
4. Analysis of the concepts of soft, hard and smart power
5. Changes in the international security environment after the end of the cold war, new security threats and the consequences on the configuration of the Greek foreign policy in International Institutions.
6. Greek foreign policy dilemmas in the light of the developments of regional subsystems (Balkans, Middle East, Eastern Mediterranean)

Dimitris N. Chrysochoou **Professor of Theories and Institutions of European Integration**

Dimitris N. Chrysochoou, BA (Athens), MSc (LSE), PhD (Reading), is Professor of Theories and Institutions of European Integration at Panteion University and Honorary University Fellow at the College of Social Sciences and International Studies of the University of Exeter (2014-16). His PhD thesis, 'From Democracies to Democracy: The Case of the European Community', received the '1997 European Studies Award' from the Foundation for the Advancement of European Studies and the Hellenic University Association for European Studies. He has been Reader in European Integration at the University of Exeter, Associate Professor of International Organization at the University of Crete and has held visiting posts at the LSE, Cambridge and Columbia universities, the Hellenic Centre for European Studies and the Centre for European Constitutional Law. He has also been Scientific Director of the Defence Analysis Institute of the Hellenic Ministry of National Defence, National Co-ordinator of the Council of Europe's programme 'Education for Democratic Citizenship and Human Rights Education' at the Hellenic Ministry of National Education and Religious Affairs, Secretary-General of the Hellenic University Association for European Studies and Member of the Governing Board of the Hellenic Foundation for Culture as representative of the Hellenic Ministry of Education and

Religious Affairs. His books include, among others, *A Republic of Europeans: Civic Potential in a Liberal Milieu* (Edward Elgar, 2011, with K. A. Lavdas), *Theorizing European Integration* (2nd edition, Routledge, 2009) and *Democracy in the European Union* (I. B. Tauris, 1998).
